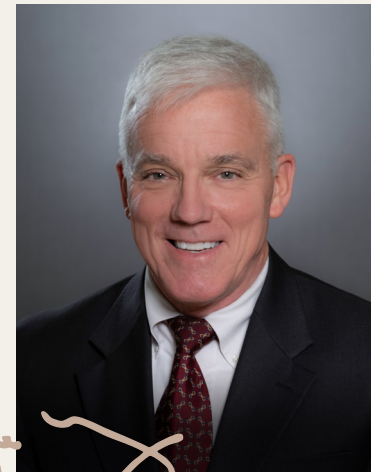
Called by Pope Leo to be “*Agents of Hope*”

Dear Friends,

Once again, as leaders of your Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington, we proudly present our 2024-2025 Annual Report.

This past year has seen great changes, with new and visionary leadership in the Catholic Church as we welcomed Pope Leo XIV and our new Archbishop, Cardinal Robert McElroy, bidding farewell to our Good Shepherd, Cardinal Wilton Gregory, and praying for

the repose of Pope Francis. We have also witnessed significant changes in government policies, many of which present new challenges for those we serve as well as for our staff. Our focus has been to leverage and expand our relationships with government and non-government partners while drawing on our significant well of organizational and individual experience. This approach allows us to pace the rapidly evolving service environment and stand firm in our commitment to serve the poor, vulnerable, and marginalized.



As our work continued last year, even amid challenges, we celebrated many milestones. **Among them, we:**

- Broke ground and commenced construction of the Conway Education Center, a new state-of-the-art facility that will welcome our children into the school and child development center in Spring 2026.
- Celebrated the 40th anniversary of our constantly expanding Health Care Network, which over the years has provided care for 70,000 clients unable to afford specialized care.
- Continued to grow our regional Task Forces in Prince George's County and Southern Maryland for stronger community partnerships and collaboration, while making in roads with establishing our Corporate Advisory Council.
- Exceeded our fundraising goal at the 2025 Gala. **Thank you!**

Even in a rapidly shifting government resourcing environment, Catholic Charities D.C. remains an efficient and grateful steward of your generosity with 86 cents of every donated dollar going directly to programs and services.

What's more, we achieved accelerated certification with the Council of Accreditation and retained Charity Navigator's highest rating, demonstrating our steadfast commitment to meeting the strictest standards for community service and careful use of donor resources.

Pope Leo, citing the Church's Jubilee Year, focused on the virtue of hope, called Catholic Charities "agents of that hope," saying *"Dear friends, I express my heartfelt gratitude for all that you and those who work with your networks do each day to put into practice the Lord's admonition to see and serve him in the poor, hungry, homeless, and people in any kind of need (cf. Mt 25:31-46)."*

Amid rising needs and retracting government funding, your continued — and hopefully expanded support — has never been more pronounced. In this time of financial uncertainty, we ask all our philanthropic partners for an even deeper level of support so Catholic Charities D.C. can continue the charitable work it has been called to do.

We remain committed to being agile and responsive to our clients, assessing the effectiveness of each program, and adjusting, as needed, to remain a beacon of hope to those navigating the storm. Toward this end, Catholic Charities D.C. is building stronger relationships with partners in the regional

More than 140,000 residents of Washington, D.C. and neighboring Maryland counties received comprehensive, person-centered wraparound social services through our 47 programs in 27 locations.

In this year alone, over 3.5 million meals were provided to those experiencing food insecurity in our community.

Over 4,800 unhoused residents of Washington, D.C. and neighboring Maryland counties found hope and refuge through our housing and shelter services.

THE CONWAY EDUCATION CENTER TAKES SHAPE

Designed to better serve children and young adults with developmental differences, Catholic Charities D.C. made great strides in the construction of the Conway Education Center.

Located on Buchanan Street between 8th and 10th Streets NE in Ward 5, the two-story, 36,300-square-foot center will replace a 1950s-era school. The education center will house the Lt. Joseph P. Kennedy Jr. Institute, which serves children and young adults with intellectual and developmental differences, and the Child Development Center, which serves children aged six weeks to three years, with and without developmental differences.

Students, faculty, and board members signed steel beams at an event held on April 23, 2025, while the groundbreaking event took place on October 2, 2024.

Thanks to input from staff and educators, the building’s architectural design will include a U-shaped design surrounding a courtyard, an outdoor classroom and garden with amphitheater-style seating, and a ramp instead of an elevator to ensure ease of movement for all students.

“Creating the Conway Education Center has been a labor of love for our dedicated faculty and staff,” said Matthew Putu, executive director of developmental disabilities services. “From the initial brainstorming sessions to the final touches, every detail has been carefully considered to ensure the best possible environment for our children.”

BUILDING SKILLS, BUILDING HOPE

For Lester, steady work was not always easy to find. When he joined Catholic Charities D.C.'s Green Construction Program, he was set on a path toward stability, dignity, and hope.

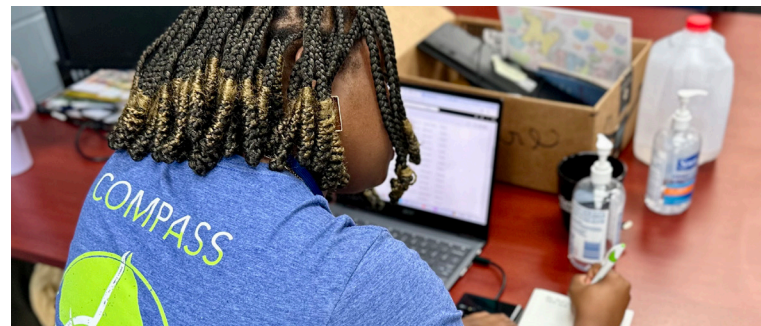
"It taught me about the rights and responsibilities of both employees and employers, and the requirements for protecting our health and safety on the job site," he said. "That knowledge gave me confidence."

The program, which led him to his current position, has opened career opportunities in the growing construction sector while emphasizing the importance of sustainable building practices. By combining classroom instruction and hands-on training, students gain the skills and certifications needed to enter apprenticeships or entry-level jobs in construction, carpentry, and electrical work.

"Construction work isn't just about physical labor; it's about skill, creativity, and art," he said. "My job is like a school, you learn from others, from their experiences, and you share knowledge."

A FATHER'S DETERMINATION

A single father of five from Ward 8, JT came to Catholic Charities D.C.'s Compass program with clear goals: stable employment and a home for his family. Living with his mother when he started services in September 2024, JT worked closely with his Compass partner to secure full-time work by January, followed by a part-time position in March.

Despite the demands of two jobs, JT remained focused and optimistic, determined to save for housing while supporting his children. His Compass partner helped him navigate D.C.'s competitive housing market, compiling listings within his budget and teaching him to advocate for himself and make informed decisions.

Through hard work, resourcefulness, and unwavering commitment, JT moved his family into their own apartment in May 2025. Now, he's setting his sights even higher: working toward homeownership to build generational wealth for his children.

A NETWORK OF HOPE

For years, Pablo served his community in Honduras as mayor, always putting others before himself. Fast forward to 2015 while living with his daughter in Silver Spring, Maryland, he was diagnosed with mucosal melanoma, a rare and aggressive cancer.

Unable to afford treatment, Pablo was referred to Catholic Charities D.C.'s Health Care Network, which connects low-income patients with volunteer medical specialists. Over several years, he received radiation, chemotherapy, and complex reconstructive jaw surgery — all provided pro-bono by Medstar Georgetown University Hospital and by volunteer doctors like Dr. Susan Pankratz and Dr. Jonathan Giurintano.

Today, at 81, Ramos is cancer-free. "Without Catholic Charities," he said through an interpreter, "I would be resting in peace. They are the voice of people without a voice and the hope of people with no hope."

The Health Care Network, which celebrated its 40th anniversary this year, has served 70,000 patients over four decades, providing life-saving care to those with nowhere else to turn.

A PATH FORWARD TO STABILITY

When William lost his job and left a turbulent home situation in October 2021, he found refuge at Catholic Charities D.C.'s New York Avenue Men's Shelter. There, he connected with case manager supervisor Donnita, whose compassionate approach helped him "let his guard down" and work toward stability.

At Catholic Charities D.C., case management is an integral and carefully planned part of many of the agency's programs, and available when clients are ready. "We don't use a cookie-cutter approach," said Donnita. "Case management is not a one-size-fits-all process because that just doesn't work."

Through their trusted relationship that Donnita built over time, William has been navigating the housing application process and gathering documents to enroll in a building maintenance certification program. Donnita meets with him at least once, sometimes twice a week, helping him complete paperwork and pursue his goals.

"Slowly but surely, I'm getting back on my feet," William said. "I don't know exactly when I'll have my own place, but I'm closer than I was a week ago, closer than I was a month ago, closer than I was a year ago."

HEALING JOURNEY

Jose, a 30-year-old from El Salvador, has lived with chronic hip pain since childhood. When he came to the United States in 2015, he hoped for a new beginning. But without medical insurance, he continued to work through unbearable pain to support his family. In 2022, a sudden, excruciating episode left him unable to stand. That moment became a turning point in his life.

Jose was referred to the Catholic Charities' Health Care Network through the Volunteer Medical Clinic, where he found the help he had been searching for. Orthopedic specialist Dr. Christopher Cannova, a long-time volunteer, diagnosed him with osteonecrosis in both hips.

Thanks to Dr. Cannova's care, Jose underwent two life-changing surgeries in May and October 2024. After months of physical therapy, he can now walk independently for the first time in years and move without the pain that once controlled his life. He dedicates himself to his recovery, walking an hour every day, and attending physical therapy.

Jose is deeply grateful to Dr. Cannova and the Health Care Network for restoring his hope and giving him a second chance in life. "Thanks to their kindness," he says, "I have a chance at a better life."

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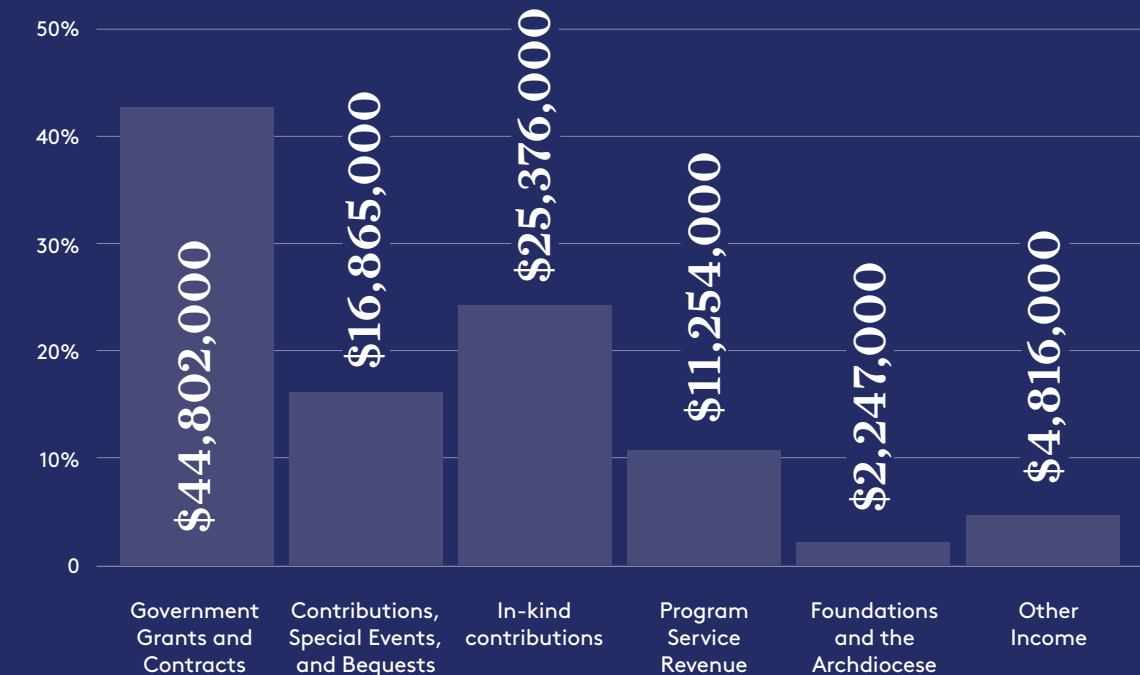
